## The library: education for all

As we discussed Tuesday, it's time for the Pottstown School District to start funding the Pottstown Public Library.

This year, Pottstown will spend about \$118 million for local government services.

Education is by far the greatest expense. Pottstown spends more on public school education than all other local government services combined.

What do we get for our money?

In Pottstown, school-aged children

and youth comprise less than 20 percent of our residents.

Over the last 50 years, the cost of education per pupil in Pottstown has risen at triple the rate of inflation.

With the seventh highest local school tax effort in Pennsylvania, Pottstown property owners are doing far more than their fair share to support our young people.

We have no idea how many of our graduates will stay in Pottstown or return after college. Chances are, most of them won't, or if they come back, they'll live in the suburbs.

The Pottstown Public Library, on the other hand, serves residents of all ages. And unlike school libraries, the public library is open afternoons, evenings, Saturdays, and all summer.

Books, videos, internet resources — everything's available at the public library. You can go on-line from home and browse the entire collection — not just Pottstown's, but almost everywhere in Pennsylvania. If the resource is in one of Montgomery County's 29 public libraries, you can probably get it in Pottstown within a few days.

Many parents bring their children to the library before they're school age to get their first books.

And of course, residents continue to patronize the library into old age.

Right now the borough government contributes \$172,000 toward the library's 2023 budget of \$760,000. If the school district took that over, the borough could use the money for other critical projects like street and sewer repairs.

Thanks to the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund passed by Congress, the school district has received a one-time windfall of more than \$14 million.

Can we use some of those funds to benefit everyone?
